Carlos Rubinstein, Chairman Brownsville, TX

Carlos Rubinstein served as a commissioner of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) from 2009 to 2013, where he supervised the overall direction and policy for TCEQ. Prior to becoming commissioner, he held a variety of positions at TCEQ including deputy executive

director, area director, regional director, and Rio Grande Watermaster. While serving as deputy executive director, Rubinstein supervised a biennial budget of approximately \$1 billion.

Before arriving at TCEQ, Rubinstein served as the city manager for the City of Brownsville. He was responsible for a \$60 million budget and overseeing over 800 employees. Rubinstein developed budgetary cost efficiencies that contributed to increasing the city's fund balance and bond rating and participated in various bond rating and market transactions with financial institutions in New York to review Brownsville's financial status. In addition to his financial and leadership duties, he developed and implemented the legislative agenda for the city. He also held the positions of health and permitting director and director of public health and emergency medical service with the City of Brownsville.

He is the Texas representative to the Western States Water Council; the Border Governors' Conference Sustainable Development worktable; the Governmental Advisory Committee, which advises the EPA Administrator on environmental concerns regarding NAFTA, the North American Agreement on Environmental Cooperation; and the Commission for Environmental Cooperation. Rubinstein is a former member of the Texas Environmental Flows Advisory Group and of the Good Neighbor Environmental Board, an independent federal advisory committee that assists the president and Congress on environmental infrastructure needs along the U.S. border with Mexico. He is the past Texas representative to the Border Governors' Conference Water worktable. Rubinstein received a bachelor's degree in biology from Pan American University.

Bech Bruun's professional experience spans positions in the executive and legislative branches of government as well as in the water industry with a large wholesale water provider.

He most recently served as director of governmental appointments for the Office of the Governor.

Prior to his time in the appointments office, he served as the government and customer relations manager for the Brazos River Authority (BRA). While at the BRA, Bruun provided strategic and legal counsel to the general manager on issues ranging from proposed legislation and agency rulemaking to general water policy.
